15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach was introduced by the curriculum of NEP, the same was implemented in the choice of the subjects by the college and the students. The New Educational Policy 2020 has given due importance to collaborative approaches in the Higher Educational System. The main tenet of NEP 2020 is liberal education, which highlights the need for multidisciplinary, comprehensive education and expresses our goal of broadening perspectives through high-quality education. In order to achieve a comprehensive and multidisciplinary education, the policy is placing focus on the flexible and innovative curriculum of higher education institution, calling for the inclusion of credit-based courses, projects and internships in the areas of community participation and service, environmental education, and value-based education. This approach sensitizes students to interconnect all sorts of knowledge and inquiry to derive effective solutions. As a result, they are confident of job opportunities in their disciplines and are able to plan their future in a variety of areas.

The policy has a fair and inclusive stance, with a blurred distinction between Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) and arts courses as well as integrated, multidisciplinary learning. It acknowledges the need to use technology and digitization to close the education gap. STEM has evolved to stand for a distinctive method of instruction and learning that is based on the different learning preferences and interests of pupils.

Digital Fluency and Artificial Intelligence being ranked as the number one skill that is most important to be successful in the new world of work, our first year degree students are introduced to modern digital world. In the Indian educational system, yoga has long been a crucial component of health, wellbeing and physical education. Thus, having yoga, health, and wellbeing as part of their curriculum in NEP 2020, enables our students to live a stress-free and healthy existence. Environmental studies and sports enable them to comprehend how the environment affects their way of life, and involvement in sports fosters discipline and a

feeling of sportsmanship. Digital fluency, Environmental Studies, Artificial intelligence, Constitution of India, Employability skills, Cyber Security and internship have helped in achieving the goal of multidisciplinary concept of higher education.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The system of ABC was adopted through NEP from the year 2021-22 and implimented successfuly. The New Education Policy places a strong emphasis on the adaptable and creative curricula of all higher education institutions, calling for the inclusion of credit-based courses and projects in the areas of volunteerism and community service, environmental education, and value-based education in order to achieve a holistic and multidisciplinary education. As per National Education Policy 2020, the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) has been envisaged to facilitate the academic mobility of students with the freedom to study across the Higher Education Institutions in the country with an appropriate "credit transfer" mechanism from one programme to another. The credits acquired by students can be deposited in an academic bank of credit and then applied toward the completion of the student's degree. The college awards credits to students at the successful completion of each semester under the NEP, which was implemented by the State Government. A total of 25 credits-which are listed in the section below—are given to the students at the end of the first semester. The same credit system is being followed in subsequent semester.

Through two ability enhancement courses that include two languages, the students receive a total of 6 credits. The subsequent 12 credits can be obtained by taking four credits of discipline-specific core subjects.

The Skill Enhancement Course- Digital Fluency fetch 2 credits per student.

As per NEP 2020, flexibility and autonomy to students is granted, by offering Open Elective courses such as Geography, Psychology, Home Science, Computer, Science Urdu, Sanskrit, Hindi etc. The Open Elective course offer 3 credits.

Value based skill enhancement courses such as Yoga, Wellness and Health etc. are offered 1 credit each.

17. Skill development:

The enhancement and promotion of employability skills among the students was taken up through exclusive traing and couching program for the students and the staff The technological development has sped up the growth of their careers and hence educational institutions are forced to introduce a wide range of innovations for a secure career and professional growth, which has a significant contribution to the advancement of the society. The National Education Policy 2020 acknowledges the significance of soft skills as essential life abilities, including communication,

teamwork, problem solving, decision-making, analytical thinking, resiliency, etc. The initiative works with an approach where academic knowledge is imparted. However, in order to advance in their professional trajectory, leadership qualities are also inculcated alongside it.

The curriculum of NEP introduces the students to various skill enhancement courses such as Digital Fluency, Artificial Intelligence, Employability skills, Cyber Security, Internship, etc.

Our students receive both training and expertise in a range of skills, including collaboration, leadership, listening, and communication, in addition to many other activities that boost their self-assurance. Students gain knowledge of the many career opportunities in , employer expectations, and applicant skill needs through this programme. The second and fourth semester students are trained in communication skills, public speaking, leadership abilities, and other skills as part of Disciples India's Skill Enrichment programme. Training programme on leadership skills, help the students understand their own strengths and shortcomings, make data-driven judgements, and develop the abilities to inspire their team and promote loyalty. For third and sixth semester students, our skill training programme includes preparation for competitive exams.

18. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The Indian knowledge system represented by classical and modern languages is inculcated among the students through appropriate curriculum and also extra-curricular activities conducted in the college.

The teaching of Indian Knowledge in NEP 2020 is appropriate to ensure effective learning of the students of India. Since the students learn through experience and observation, proper exposure of the diverse culture which lies within India help them in building awareness about our heritage.

The aim of education is also to create awareness among the students about our national culture. Care should be taken to create cultural harmony. This is achieved through the teaching of different language and literature. The cultural activities of the college will also ensure this.

The curriculum of NEP also ensures the induction of cultural aspects with all their diversities.

The endeavor of the four chairs established by our college and also the celebration of national days and the birth anniversaries of great social and national (even international) leaders will surely synchronies western thought with Indian culture without losing rationality.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The programme and courses offered by the institution are in line with the vision and mission statement of the institution. As our college is associated with Karanataka State Akkamahadevi Women University Vijayapura, the institution follows the entire syllabus, which has been developed and approved by the university. All the courses offered at the institution have distinct programme objectives, programme outcome, and programme specific outcome, ensuring that the students know what to expect at the end of the course. The students are informed about the numerous employment opportunities and higher education options, which lead to clear preparation on the part of the student to select the path when the course is through. As part of the National Education Policy, an interdisciplinary approach to curriculum is introduced. Each department provides necessary orientation to students at the start of their semester in order to effectively convey the course materials to them. Students are well informed about the assessment methodology of their course. The students are also given information about the criteria of assessment and the scores required to clear each course. Each course is evaluated using a variety of factors, such as completing internal tests, attendance, presentations, classroom engagement, and others, which are all fully presented to the students at the beginning of the semester. The up-gradation of the course contents are done by the Board of Studies and the other members from the University. Additionally, the institution offers plenty of possibilities for students to learn beyond the curriculum, through organising seminars, guest lectures, workshops, IT Visits, project exhibitions, model making, poster presentation, value added courses, and other events that widen their scope of learning. Our institution offers a variety of training programmes which are given to students in an effort to boost their employability and competency. The institution has the necessary physical infrastructure and qualified teachers who actively involve the students in research-oriented activities, which are crucial in a teaching-learning environment. Our students participate in internship training as requirement of the curriculum, which gives them real-world work experience and exposure.
